Behaviour across the school has also improved significantly, with fewer incidents being recorded and a stronger sense of respect and cooperation in classrooms and around the school. Let's keep up this fantastic effort as we move through the rest of the term!



### Foreign Language Spelling and Translation Bees





Each year, our Year 7 classes enter the Foreign Language Spelling Bee and our Year 8&9 classes enter the Translation Bee. The top competitors from each class take part in the School competition. The top 3 school competitors take part in the Regional Final and the winners from the Regional Final take part in the National Final at Cambridge University. Belper School is always a strong competitor and we have students in the National Final every year. It is a great opportunity to see other language learners from all types of schools from across England.



## **Languages Competitions**

At Belper our students have the opportunity to take part in several competitions throughout the year. Years 7-13 can enter the Anthea Bell Translation Competition, run by the University of Cambridge. Students can really combine a love of literature and languages when translating a poem or an extract from a novel. Belper School has had several regional winners over the last few years!

The University of Nottingham organises a creative competition and this is one of our favourite events of the year. Students have produced stop-motion videos or short films, sung songs, composed songs and much more - all in a foreign language! We are amazed by the creativity and talent shown year after year!




Libby's performance of When I'm Gone in Irish Gaelic wowed the judges and Poppy's self-penned poem in French impressed the panel

2 teams of Year 10 students took part in an International Space Challenge. They had to design a space hotel, build a prototype and give 2 presentations: one about the science behind their design; and a marketing presentation in French or German. They had to work as a team and play to each person's strength so that deadlines could be met.



# Year 9 Trip



47 students from year 9 spent 5 days in Germany exploring sights along the beautiful Rhine river. We visited Cologne with its magnificent cathedral, had some free samples at the Lindt chocolate museum, enjoyed a traditional Schnitzel and had a super tour of the Bayer Leverkusen stadium. Other highlights included a trip on the Rhine river, a visit to Koblenz and a day at the Phantasialand theme park. There was lots of talk of planning return trips to Germany!

## A-Levels

Each of our languages A-Level students undertakes an independent research project as preparation for their speaking exam. They prepare a 2 minute presentation on their project and then have a discussion for 10 minutes where they are questioned by the visiting examiner. Students become experts in their chosen area of study and interests vary wildly. Over the past few years, independent research projects have been carried out on a wide-range of topics, including the following: Should Fritz Haber be celebrated as a hero?; The evolving use of non-binary language in French; The pros and cons of reintroducing wolves to Germany; Secularism in France; To what extent should German billionaires declare historical links to the Third Reich?; Haitian children given away to work as domestic servants.

Whether it's taking part in a Spelling or Translation Bee competition in front of 100 students and parents in a packed lecture hall, delivering assemblies to whole year groups, being a Languages Ambassador and helping with a wide variety of requests within the department, or delivering a presentation to a full governors' meeting, we are proud of the confidence that Belper students develop and display due to their involvement in our languages projects. ## Belper School and Toyota City

We have been so lucky to have been involved in a project to link educational establishments in Derbyshire and Toyota City in Japan. The 2 areas celebrated the 25th anniversary of their twinning last year. At Belper School, we have been involved in several projects with students from Toyota City.



We were privileged in September to host 17 students from schools in Toyota City. On arrival, families were treated to a magnificent performance of a song in English and Japanese by our guests. They were warmly hosted by the families of Belper School students and spent 5 days in school with us, experiencing normal lessons, as well as some bespoke Drama, Maths and PE lessons. During the week, they also has a tour of Belper Mill and visited to Kedleston Hall. The week was a wonderful opportunity for both Belper School and Toyota City students to share information about their lives and to discover what interests they had in common. There were many tears on saying goodbye, but we hope that this week was just the beginning of some lasting international friendships.

For the third year in a row, Year 10 students have taken part in conversations online with students from our partner school in Japan, Ryūjin Junior High School. Students shared presentations about their families, schools, interests and their towns and then spent the remainder of the time chatting. By the time the students had to say goodbye, there was lots of laughter and conversation was flowing naturally. These annual meetings are such a nice way to feel closer to our peers who are 5,860 miles away!





College students from Nagoya, near Toyota City, visited our 6th formers for a day of sports, presentations by the Japanese students and informal chatting (and snacking!) between students.

# Trip to Toyota City 2024



15 students from Year 10 travelled to Toyota City in Japan in February. The visit was supported by Derbyshire County Council and Toyota City's Board of Education. Students spent 4 days at Ryūjin Junior High School, each with a different class. Alongside their new classmates, they did lessons, had lunch and joined in with the daily cleaning duties. Students also got the chance to spend a day at Kita High School where they learnt how a traditional tea ceremony is performed. Whilst in Japan, the students visited the beautiful Korankei Gorge and made washi paper, as well as visiting a Kabuki theatre, the art museum and the Toyota car museum. The most challenging part of the week was attending a very formal meeting with Toyota City's mayor and delivering a presentation in Japanese.

This visit really showed students that having a common language to communicate really widens the connections that you can make in life. Many students have continued to learn Japanese since the trip.
