#### **Subject: Update on the Academisation Process**

We hope this letter finds you and your families well. We are writing to provide you with an update on the academisation process currently underway for our group of schools.

As many of you are aware, the decision to join an academy trust is driven by our collective commitment to providing the best possible education and opportunities for our children. The transition to academy status is a significant step that aims to enhance the quality of education, improve resources, and ensure sustainable development for our school communities.

You may also be aware that our schools have jointly identified The Embark Federation as the trust that can best support our school communities. The Embark Federation's wonderful ethos, family focus, and the support they bring to each of our schools align perfectly with our vision for the future. With their help, we are confident that we will continue to achieve our goals and provide the highest quality education for our pupils.

The Embark Federation is a Derbyshire trust working for our local communities. It has developed a fantastic reputation across the county and nationally. This has meant The Embark Federation is experiencing high demand across the county. In turn, the process of gaining official Department for Education (DfE) approval is taking a long time, and consequently, the timelines to join a trust for all of our schools have been extended. As the fastest-growing trust locally, Embark and the DfE are committed to managing this process carefully for all schools, in order to provide the best possible support for each school as they join.

As a group, we remain committed to ensuring a successful transition to the right academy trust for all our schools and communities.

### **Next Steps:**

For the time being, our schools will remain local authority schools and continue to receive support from the county council, as well as each other. We are also in the fortunate situation of being able to work with The Embark Federation on a lot of school improvement priorities, as well as being able to send pupils out of school on many enrichment activities. We will continue to engage in this way over the coming year.

We appreciate your patience and understanding during this period and look forward to sharing future updates when they are available.

## Spring Dress Code Reminder

For those of you who don't know me, my name is Stewart Summerell, and I have had the pleasure of being Head of the English Faculty for over 10 years. I am immensely proud of the curriculum we have created for the students incorporating English Language, English Literature, Media Studies, and our most recent addition, Film Studies.

In this month's newsletter I am going to highlight some of the amazing things that have taken place so far this year, and what exciting opportunities still await the students in our care.

### Key Stage 3 (Years 7 – 9)

Our KS3 curriculum continues to develop, with an additional lesson this year devoted to the introduction of the new oracy curriculum, alongside the embedded library literacy lesson students take part in each fortnight, and the wide and diverse content we cover.

A major highlight of the year so far has been the introduction of the new oracy curriculum at KS3, exploring the four key strands of oracy: physical, cognitive, linguistic, and social and emotional. All students have a timetabled oracy lesson each two-week cycle allowing them to develop their skills, and confidence through structured talk. Overseen by our amazing literacy co-ordinator Tamara Smith, it has been very well received by the students, as well as external visitors who commented on how well spoken our Year 7 students were on a recent Secondary Mastery Specialist Maths Program visit.

Shobha and Nicola were amazed at the level of oracy amongst students displayed in all the classes we visited, with notable confidence when it came to healthy challenge, developing ideas and addressing misconceptions.'

## Key Stage 4 – (Years 10 and 11)

Our KS4 curriculum has also recently undergone some changes. All students take English Language and English Literature as core subjects at GCSE, but now students have the opportunity to study Media Studies and our latest addition Film Studies as part of their pathway. Both of these have proven very popular amongst students due to the excellent course design and the management of Steven Millar – our subject leader.

Another exciting development is the introduction of a different core text at GCSE English Literature – with A Christmas Carol being taught as the 19th century text across the whole of Year 10. This has led to high level of engagement and encouraging outcomes in the early assessments.

Year 11 have started their final run into the main summer series of exams, with the mock outcomes indicating another set of positive results for the students. As always, the English faculty team have gone above and beyond offering a wide range of revision, and study sessions catering for all levels of attainment and aspiration. The sessions are well attended and allow the students to become the best version of themselves and achieve the grades they need to go onto what they intend to do in September.

We again plan on offering the students the opportunity to take part in exam breakfasts before the English Language and English Literature exams, where they will receive final advice and support, as well as a croissant or pancake for energy, as they partake in their final exams

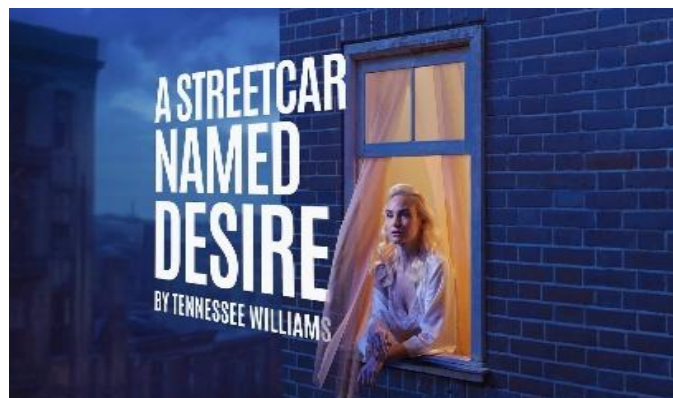

## **Key Stage 5 – Sixth Form**

Our KS5 courses continue to offer students the opportunity to study A-Levels in English Language, English Literature and Media Studies, with the plan for Film Studies A-Level to be offered for the first-time next year due to the success of the course at KS4.

The Year 13 students are busy finalising their coursework and readying themselves for the final few months of learning before the summer exam series in May. The A-level team are optimistic that the students who put the hard yards in over the final stretch of the courses will achieve what they need to go onto their post-18 pathway.

The Year 12 students are now fully immersed in the world of sixth form, and the demands and expectations that come with it. They have completed two internal assessments to date, with early indicators suggesting they could be one of our highest achieving academic cohorts in recent years.
